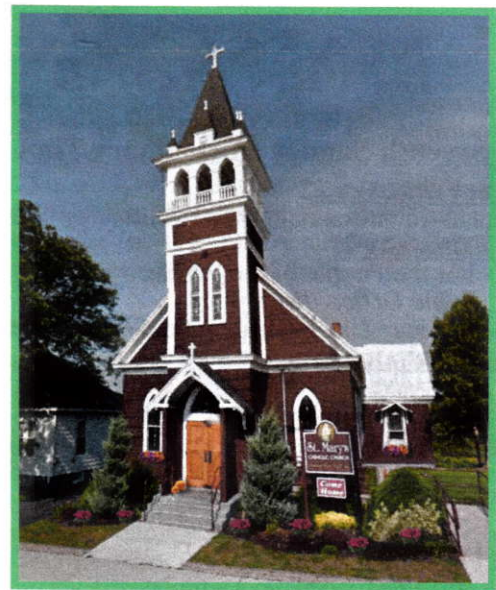

UPDATE ON OUR MISSION AS A DIOCESE

This is a challenging time for the Church and our diocese, as we work to continue our mission to catechize, sanctify and serve the people of God in the North Country while simultaneously trying to bring about reconciliation and healing to those who were so grievously wounded by sexual abuse. We want to update you about how we are continuing our mission while facing lawsuits under the Child Victims Act.

Our diocese has been working to address the sexual abuse scandal for decades in a serious and determined manner. Our goal is to provide healing to victims and prevent abuse from occurring. We have implemented policies and procedures toward those goals. We require all volunteers and employees to undergo background checks and participate in safe environment training. All allegations are reported to the appropriate district attorney or law enforcement agency. All claims are evaluated by our independent Review Board, predominately lay women and men with experience and background in abuse cases, which assesses each case and recommends appropriate actions.

The policies and procedures also call for pastoral outreach to victims who have been harmed by this evil. Assistance is offered to victims through the Victims' Assistance Coordinator. Bishop LaValley is available to meet with all victims.

In 2018, as part of the Year of Mercy, we reached out to victims of abuse through the Independent Reconciliation and Compensation Program (IRCP) seeking reconciliation with victims and compensating them for what they suffered. We were able to resolve 38 claims through this program. Additionally, our diocesan attorney was able to resolve 14 claims outside the IRCP.

In January 2019, the Child Victims Act (CVA) became law in New York. Among other things, the Act opened a one-year window (from August 14, 2019 to August 13, 2020) for victims to bring a claim of sexual abuse that was previously time barred.

Since the CVA's window opened, 23 lawsuits have been filed against the Diocese of Ogdensburg, all of which involve claims of abuse that occurred decades ago, prior to the institution of our current safe environment policies and procedures. We have not had a report of sexual abuse of a minor occurring after 1999. More lawsuits may be filed, and we are unable at this time to determine the number of lawsuits that may be filed while the CVA window is open.

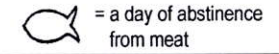
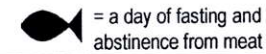
The Church in the North Country continues to focus on discipleship while addressing these lawsuits. We simply cannot stop doing the work we are called to do as Church. With the help of professionals, we are evaluating our diocesan assets to determine how we can maintain our mission while addressing the needs and claims of victims. Our staff and professional advisors are committed to responding to victims and to CVA lawsuits while continuing our mission of preaching the Gospel and reaching all in need. Chapter 11 reorganization has proved to be a positive way for other Catholic dioceses to address victims' claims in the most fair and equitable manner possible while giving the dioceses the opportunity to continue vital ministries into the future. For these reasons, it is one of the options being considered by our diocese. No decision has yet been made.









It is our hope that the process to resolve CVA lawsuits will have minimal impact on parishes and parish life.

From the Pastor:

Wednesday is ASH WEDNESDAY!

We begin the season of LENT, a time in which we try to unite ourselves more closely to the Lord Jesus Christ as we journey toward his passion, death and resurrection. There are 3 scheduled Masses and ashes will be blessed and distributed at each. The daily Mass schedule is the same as last year. You probably remember that we changed the schedule a few years ago offering different times for the celebration of Mass. People seemed to appreciate the change of times – some morning Masses as well as evening.

The entire season of Lent should be observed in a spirit of prayer and penance. Each day we try to do something special but especially on the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics who have reached their 14th birthday are bound to abstain totally from meat on the Fridays of Lent. Much like last year we will have meatless SOUP SUPPERS each Friday at St. James. These were inaugurated a few years ago and were very popular. The schedule will be: 5pm – Stations of the Cross, 5:30pm – Lenten Mass, 6:00pm – Soup Supper with bread in the Community Room. Please join us for the Fridays of Lent for this special prayer and meal time. Make it a family Lenten devotion.

This Lent our community will also participate in Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowl, a faith-in-action program that will help us experience Lenten spirituality by living in solidarity with people in need around the world. CRS Rice Bowls help Catholics in the US live out the Lenten pillars of prayer, fasting and almsgiving in union with our poorest brothers and sisters. You can pick up your Rice Bowl after Mass – they are located in the Gathering Space in each church. Keep your Rice Bowl near your family dinner table during Lent so that you can refer to it each night.

Lent 2020

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Pope Francis concludes his Lenten Message this year with a challenge for you and me: "...to become what Christ asks His disciples to be: the salt of the earth and the light of the world" (cf. Mt. 5:13-14). Lent is always a graced time for reflection on our growth in discipleship. The Holy Father urges us to fix our eyes on the Paschal Mystery and be converted to an open and sincere dialogue with Jesus as the means to zealous discipleship.

This is an especially urgent call given the troubled times in which we live. At the Chrism Mass back in 2014, the Diocese set out to do precisely this. We fixed our eyes on the Church of the North Country and presented a Pastoral Vision that is Christ-led, Christ-fed and Hope-filled. Our Envisioning Process helped us establish Diocesan Priorities and Goals. Now, six years later, with 20/20 Pastoral Vision, we continue to keep our eyes and hearts focused on: following Jesus as disciples in mission; nourishing our lives through the Sacraments, particularly the Eucharist; and instilling hope for the future through pastoral planning.

For generations, the Church has taught the value of fasting, almsgiving and prayer in helping us be the salt of the earth and the light for the world. They are important means for us to stay focused on our Diocesan Priorities of: *Creating a Culture of Vocations, Strengthening Faith Formation in Family Life and Building Parishes with Living Stones.*

As we begin this Holy Season of Lent, we persevere in our mission as local Church to be passionate disciples of Jesus Christ. I encourage you to continue to be active participants in the faith life of your parish. Be a source of loving support for your priests.

My prayer is that these next forty days, as disciples in mission, we might pray fervently for peace in our world and for healing and the purification of our Church. We pray for the courage and humility to be the salt of the earth and light of the world. May our prayer "penetrate deep within us and chip away at our hardness of heart in order to convert us ever more fully to God and His will."
